An Invitation to Lent 2021

"Life is like riding a bicycle. To keep your balance you must keep moving." This advice, given by famous German physicist, Albert Einstein, to his son Eduard, in a letter dated 05 February 1930, is still relevant and useful, ninety years later.

Isn't it somewhat disheartening that we will journey through a second Lenten season while battling a pandemic? However, intertwined with our personal challenges and sometimes dire circumstances, is the fact that the world still rotates on its axis and the many other human-made problems we read about, hear of and see in communities near and far, continue unabated. We yearn for troubled moments to pass but we cannot dictate when they will. But, what we as Christians can do, is practise the balance of hope in times of trial.

This is the aim of the St. Jude's Writers, who for the past thirteen years, during the Lenten season, have walked the same familiar paths and performed the same age-old rituals and yet, found new meaning in and from them. They have sought to offer hope through the inspired words of God, balanced with the everyday lived experiences.

And so, I join the St. Jude's Writers in inviting you to pursue a deeper relationship with God and with each other, as a Christian community. We also seek to engage our children and young people and to encourage them to explore the mystery of their faith, as we are aware that they too need to be inspired by hope in Jesus Christ, especially amid these trying times.
